The conference will conclude with an open event honoring the 50th anniversary of the Polytechnic School uprising, focusing on the role of the labor movement and workers in various periods of social struggles, in relation to international developments. The junta period and the Polytechnic uprising were during the Cold War. The current period is one of evolving global conflict and emerging multicentricism. How do international developments affect the labor movement? What is the impact of developments such as wage dumping, new technologies, and multifaceted repression? How did the labor movement function then and now? There will be a round table discussion with the participation of activists against the dictatorship, members of the labor union, workers, and students.
